

(22). Lodge Farm, house, over 1½ m. W. of the church, is of two storeys with attics. The main block was built early in the 16th century with a slightly later wing at the S. end. There are late 17th-century additions on the N. and W., and a porch of the same date on the E. Much of the original close-set framing is exposed, and the upper storey of the original block projects on the E. and N. on curved brackets. Inside the building the S.E. room has an early 17th-century ceiling of three large panels. The staircase, of the same period, has square newels with shaped terminals.

7. Interior: (Disposition of rooms, if original, giving fittings as they occur (see list), beginning with the ground floor, following with the basement, and working up to the attics: staircases in the same manner.)

The roof is of "Green Post" construction.
